Eco-church

I have had some correspondence about last week's 'zero waste' shopping idea from Carol Simmons: There is Bare Bones in Purton, which is a local business run by Andrew Hiscock (butcher) where you can take your own plastic boxes and buy loose frozen fruits and vegetables, nuts, seeds, herbs and spices, tea/coffee – plus of course meat and fish. If you don't have the appropriate receptacle he will sell stuff in recyclable paper bags. He also sells Eco-friendly cleaning products. May be worth letting interested folks know? I go there and the quality is good.

Tip 6) Wash at 30c

Most modern washing machines are designed to work very efficiently at lower temperatures and decreasing the temperature of your wash from 40c to 30c could save 18kg of CO2 per year.
